

### Making Bricks Without Straw

That same day Pharaoh commanded the taskmasters of the people, as well as their supervisors, "You shall no longer give the people straw to make bricks, as before; let them go and gather straw for themselves. But you shall require of them the same quantity of bricks as they have made previously; do not diminish it, for they are lazy;..." (Exodus 5:6-8)

Have you ever tried to do something without enough resources? I'm sure you have and more than once. Perhaps you have stretched paychecks to meet expenses when there were more days than dollars. Or, maybe, you have stretched your strength to meet the needs of a particular long day or busy period in your life. You know what it is like to metaphorically make bricks without straw. You know what it is like to meet expectations without the resources to do so.

Every church has expectations. We expect a worship service to be available on Sunday. We expect the grass to be cut and the snow to be shoveled. We expect the pastor to visit the sick and dying, preach and teach, baptize and officiate at weddings. The session and deacons have expectations attached to their duties and responsibilities.

However, every expectation needs people power so that it can be realized. Much more may be needed besides people power, but the work of the people is always needed to reach the expectations in the church. Without straw bricks cannot be made. Without commitment and the talents of people the expectations for CCPC cannot be met.

For many years the number of people willing and able to do the work of the church to meet the expectations has always been a percentage of the church. After the strain of COVID, the ratio of workers to expectations is significantly smaller in every church with which I'm familiar. People are tired. Some people are no longer there.

The Hebrew people were not lazy, and neither are you. CCPC is a spirit-filled and hardworking church, and yet, times have changed, and available people, finances and resources have changed as they have for many churches. We are not alone in facing the issue of expectations and resources. Please do not add guilt and shame to an already complicated situation.

The questions we need to answer for the sake of CCPC and our new pastor is have our expectations of what a pastor does, an elder does, a deacon does, a member does changed, or are they the same? Will we ask our new pastor, our staff, our session, deacons and committees to meet the same expectations we had in 2019 or 1999 with less people power, finances and resources? If so, what will happen? If not, how will we work with our new pastor to reset expectations to match the people power, finances and resources that are available? If we want to keep our expectations the same who will step forward to add to the people power, finances, and resources?

Part of the way to support your new pastor, staff, session, board of deacons, and every committee is to work with your new pastor to set the expectations for the near future. It does not mean that CCPC will not go back to doing past things or new things. However, it does mean that you can do much to be a faithful disciple in a faithful church and not wear your-self, your leaders and your new pastor into burn out.

### A Message From the Reopening Committee

The reopening committee has been tasked with the job of deciding whether it is safe for us to return to doing things we did before the covid 19 pandemic. We have taken each step in this journey prayerfully looking at the data available and listening to the desires of the congregation. It has not always been an easy or popular task.

We have removed most of the restrictions covid has required. The big question remaining is should we continue to require the congregation to wear masks while singing. The science has demonstrated that masks do help prevent the spread of disease. Science has also demonstrated that singing carries the germ carrying micro droplets further and with more force than just talking. Wearing masks while singing reduces the chance of spreading disease. We all know the golden rule where Jesus says, "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you."

Considering these scriptures and considering the science, the reopening committee recommends that we continue wearing our masks while we sing. We will reconsider the question again in the spring.



Afghan Refugee Family Update

Together with a consortium of other churches involved in the Bowie Support Housing Corporation (BSHC), CCPC is sponsoring the Moahids, a refugee family from Afghanistan, in Alpha House. The family's transition continues to go smoothly.

Sami Moahid began a new job in his field (civil engineering) in late September. Because his college degree and professional achievements originated in Afghanistan and have not yet been evaluated for U.S. equivalency, the only job for which he could qualify was an entry-level position. His new employer provides health insurance, a 401(k) plan, and a company truck. However, company policy prohibits the use of the vehicle for personal purposes. Fatima Moahid continues to be tutored in English by Mary Brock. Mary reports that Fatima is making great progress. She is now able to have short conversations about her home and family and she is expanding her vocabulary daily. Fatima seems to be acclimating to the American way of life because she told Mary (in English) that she likes to go shopping.

The Support Team has located a van for the family (with seating for all seven of them), but funding for the van is about \$3,000 short. If you would like to help with a financial donation for the van or other general needs, you can donate online through the CCPC website or by sending a check to CCPC with "Afghan family support" in the memo line.

The BSHC also would like to identify a volunteer grant writer, experienced in writing grant proposals for not-for-profit organizations. The individual would also need to research what grants are available for BSHC's mission.
