

Shalom = "peace" in Hebrew

When Jesus returned after the resurrection, His first word to the disciples was "Shalom." "Peace to you!" (Luke 24:36)

"Peace be with you" is the most common greeting in the Middle East and is still spoken today in Israel and Palestine by Muslims, Christians, and Jews. Not just a wish for happiness and good health, it means complete wholeness, serenity, fulfilment, freedom from trouble, and liberation from anything that hinders contentment. So when uttering SHALOM, you are wishing full presence, peace, and prosperity of all the blessedness of God. It is far more than an external condition, but implies an internal sense of all being well with our souls. When we pass the peace of Christ to someone in worship, we are praying a blessing on that person, asking that all parts of their life be in right order.



Bringing Together of God's Peoples



Since the earliest practices of the temple, olive branches have been incorporated into the temple's interior and exterior and came to represent Israel herself.

Olive oil has also been considered as a sacred symbol because ancient kings in Israel were anointed with it.

About Israel, the Apostle
Paul wrote, "If you were
cut from what is by nature
a wild olive tree, and
grafted, contrary to nature,
into a cultivated olive tree,
how much more will
these, the natural
branches, be grafted back
into their own olive
tree" (Romans 11:24) and

Gentiles, being "a wild olive shoot, were grafted in among the others and now share in the nourishing root of the olive tree" (Romans 11:17), with the olive tree representing God's people.



In the Garden of Gethsemane ('oil press' in Greek)

- Before taken to be crucified, Jesus' last will and testament was "Peace I leave with you. My peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Your heart must not be troubled or fearful" (John 14:27)
- A 2012 study tested three of olive trees in that very garden are amongst the oldest known to science. Dates of AD 1090, 1166, and 1198 were obtained by carbon dating of their trunks; and found that the trees were originally planted from the same parent plant. Indicating that perhaps they could have been sprouts reviving from the older roots. However 'the results have not settled the questions of whether the gnarled trees are the very same which sheltered Jesus, because the trees can grow back from roots after being cut down." Find it comforting that new growth can come from something that old and even injured!

From the MOUNT OF OLIVES to the SERMON ON THE MOUNT

Jesus delivers Beatitudes (blessed sayings) that essentially outlines what it means to be a moral and upright person in the eyes of God, and in particular

this verse:







Used to read this and pat myself on the back, because I don't like to argue and overall am pretty peaceable – so assumed I was a peacemaker, but this is wrong.

Peacekeeper ≠ Peacemaker

Avoids conflict


Keeps peace by not doing anything controversial


Accommodate issues, gloss over problems acting as if everything alright

Runs *toward* conflict to create peace

Actively pursues peace, sometimes creating friction

Not afraid of strife and just trying to appease warring parties









5 Characteristics of a Peacemaker*

1) Peace rules the heart.

We only can calm wars and tempers when conquer our own battles raging inside us.

And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." Philippians 4:7

Not to say there won't be times when need to focus on internal issues, but to create peace among others we must find it in Christ alone first.

2) Peacemakers are active, not passive.

A true peacemaker would try to bring the two parties together, disarm them of their weapons, and work through the hard stuff with them to help them reconcile. That's putting in the peacekeeping work.

3.) Are Gentle

If you are hostile, no one is going to really listen to you – much less go to you for advice or reconcile with you.

As a peacemaker, we must be willing to listen, and be slow and careful in how we respond. People's feelings may be involved, or it might be a sensitive topic. That does not mean we will always agree with people. Sometimes agreeing to disagree, politely, is all we can do to keep the peace. And that's an important step.

4.) Resolute in the truth

While peacemakers are open to hearing all sides, they are NOT willing to set aside God's truth to appease someone else. Muting our own convictions and affirming someone else's, if it goes against ours, can be just as wrong. Seek out what the Bible says about a certain situation before diving in. Ask the Holy Spirit to help guide you. But always stick to God's truth (not just your own) and what the Bible says.

5.) Be Patient

In 1781 Ben Franklin wrote to John Adams, "Blessed are the peacemakers' is, I suppose, for another world. In this world, they are **frequently cursed**."

If you are trying to reconcile with someone else or trying to help two parties reconcile, things can get messier before they get better. Be willing to not only work through that mess, but able to walk away if necessary.

Sometimes all we can do is plant seeds and wait for God to grow them and bring about a harvest in His own time. But if we're patient, peacemaking can be divine work.

"The harvest of righteousness is sown in peace by those who make peace."

- James 3:18

Practical Steps to get us going in the right direction:


- 1) Take it to God. Surrender the broken relationship to Him and let Him know you want to fix it! Before talking to those involved, praying to God helps us bring perspective and tenderness to the situation.
- 2.) Make the first move. Take the lead in reaching out to the person to reconcile or start building up a relationship.

Practical Steps (continued)

- 3.) Attack the problem, not the person. Empathize with their feelings, consider all the things going on in their situation. Clarify, don't confront. Even if unable to meet resolution, emphasize reconciliation, so at least have a relationship base to build from.
- 4.) Stop talking bad about the other person or situation to others. You can always find someone ready and willing to validate your opinion, so don't fall into that trap. That's not going to bring about peace but hinder any chance of reconciliation. Because as the game 'Telephone' demonstrates, messages get mutated along the way but always find their way back around.

"No rotten talk should come from your mouth, but only what is good for the building up of someone in need, in order to give grace to those who hear." (Ephesians 4:29)



Mandates Action



Notice Jesus did <u>not</u> say "Blessed are the peace *wishers* or the peace *hopers* or the peace *dreamers* or the peace *lovers* or the peace *talkers*."

We are to be Peace *Makers*. Peace must be *made*. Peace doesn't happen by chance.

Someone has to drag the combatants to the table, give them a reason to put down their arms, and settle their disagreements.

Peacemaking does not mean to yield to merely appease another's stubbornness or selfishness. Instead of trying to accommodate everyone, pursue all the beauty and blessedness of God upon another.

Grace Before Peace x Troublemaker

- Spreading rumors and gossip about others, looking for scandal, and always finding
 faults shows one is unwilling to be a peacemaker but the opposite: troublemaker.
 They create conflict in their external world often because they have internal strife,
 but the good news (and thanks to the Good News) they can change!
- The salutation of the Apostle Paul's letters almost always begin "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ" (Phil. 1:2). Reading his letters, the order is never reversed to "peace and grace." Grace always comes before peace. We have to experience the grace of God, before we can experience the peace of God. We do that by coming to come into relationship with God through his son Jesus Christ.
- So fellow Christians, bring on God's mercy by having patience with others' shortcomings and being slow to take offence. That's hard because everywhere you go there are people behaving badly. With selfish & rude way we often act it's a wonder why God wants to save us at all, but figure if gracious God have mercy on me I can share a little bit with others.

Peacemakers are people of hope, connected to God's vision of peace that reminds us the world does not need to be the way it is. God's vision calls us to explore new possibilities. God's vision preserves us as we work to bring those possibilities into reality, reminding us that God's will, will be done.

This involves laughter, smiles, dancing, and singing. Peacemakers make wonderful colleagues and friends. Celebrating small steps, little victories and moments of grace amazing, helps sustain peacemakers for the long haul. Trusting God to guide and bless our efforts-sometimes in ways we cannot even begin to imagine!
